Constitution

The Welsh Books Council's governing instrument is a written constitution. The Welsh Books Council is an independent unincorporated association established for charitable purposes only. The Constitution was amended on 30 June 2017.

The Council and its committees

The Books Council is governed by a Council and Executive Committee which are appointed under the terms of its Constitution, and comprise representatives of local authorities and a cross section of the cultural organisations of Wales. Members of the Executive Committee serve as trustees of the charity. The Nominations Panel, a sub-committee of the Executive Committee, appoints members to specialist panels which report to the Executive Committee. The function of the Nominations Panel is to ensure that the system of appointing members, through an open advertising process, is conducted with fairness and transparency, in line with best practice.

A summary of the year

Reading for Pleasure – The Power of Reading

Reflecting on my first full 12 months as Chief Executive of the Books Council and looking ahead to the coming financial year during a period of political and economic uncertainty, it comes as a great comfort that some universal truths remain unchanged; in particular the one that ultimately underpins, informs and guides our work: the transformative power of reading.

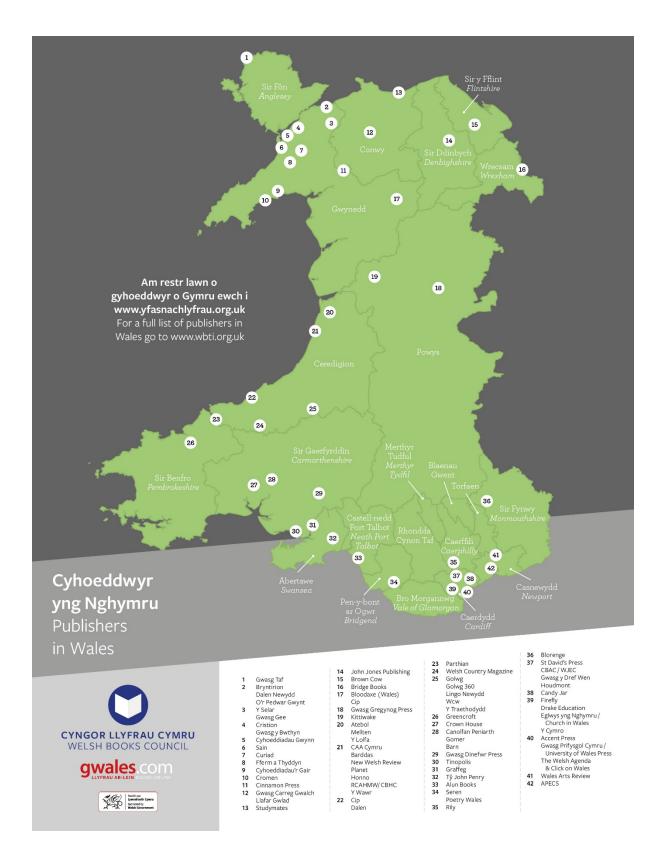
We have an excellent track record of working collaboratively and we have been a long-standing partner of the Reading Agency, World Book Day and Quick Reads, running a number of schemes that promote reading for pleasure in collaboration with schools and libraries. The reach and impact of these has been considerable and we are looking to extend our activities in these areas, actively pursuing new grant opportunities.

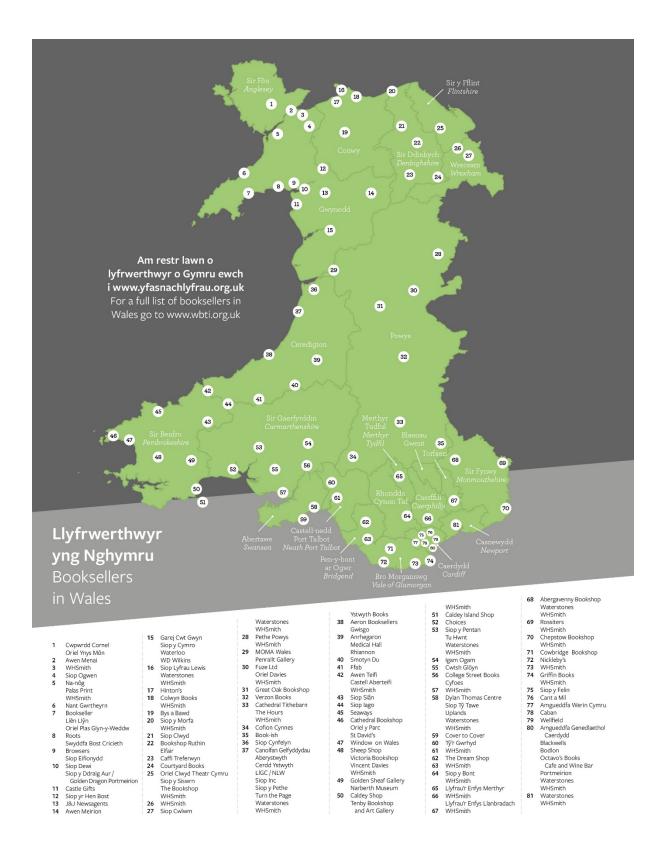

Research has proved the link between reading and academic attainment, but also increasingly its impact on the general well-being of people. Never is this more true than when individuals see themselves, their lives and their communities reflected in the books and magazines they read. This not only pertains to original Welsh-language content, important as it undoubtedly is, but goes much further. A Welsh dimension in English-language publishing in Wales is equally important, especially when the output from our nearest neighbour, England, is not only readily available but also originates from the largest publishing sector in the world.

It is within this context that the long-term strategic support via our grants system ensures that publishers can invest in authentic Welsh voices that not only delight readers and nurture a sense of belonging but also inspire the next generation of authors. These micro-enterprises – and all of the publishers we support fall into this category – form an important part of the foundation economy: they are mostly located in rural, disadvantaged areas, yet offer skilled employment opportunities which are partly supported by us; they also make disproportionate use of local supply chains that underpin local communities and the Welsh economy.





Despite the importance and ever-changing array of digital formats, the printed book has an enduring appeal. The logistics and operations infrastructure necessary to service not only brick and mortar booksellers but also online retailers is epitomised by our Distribution Centre: operating both as a distributor and wholesaler it offers 15,000 individual titles and holds 500,000 books at any given time. As a self-funded commercial enterprise, the Distribution Centre employs 19 staff and offers substantial indirect support to publishers and booksellers by offering highly subsidised distribution

terms. It is therefore a crucial link in a supply chain that services all of Wales and includes nontraditional outlets such at tourist information centres, Cadw, National Museums and the National Trust, whilst the international market is serviced through gwales.com.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

Financial Review

A total income of £6.8m was received during the year compared to £6.7m in 2016/17. A total of £6.9m (£6.7m in 2016/17) was spent which leaves a net deficit of £98,010 (2016/17 – a remainder of £49,483). On 31 March 2018, the net assets (excluding pension liabilities) were £1.1m (2016/17: £1m).

Reserves Policy

This Reserves Policy is designed to ensure that the Council has sufficient funds to meet unforeseen capital expenditure and to deal with risk factors associated with the running of a Distribution Centre which does not receive funding from the public purse. The Books Council keeps these financial funds in a number of categories:

Unrestricted Funds

- Capital Funds £450,000 to meet the historic cost of buildings and unexpected capital expenditure.
- Revenue Funds
 - Pension: At 31 March 2018, there was a remainder of £1,442,000 (2016/17: £1,842,000). The Trustees have agreed contributions with the Dyfed Pension Fund until 31 March 2021, so they no longer have control over the amount of this fund.
 - Council: Maintain a reserve balance of no more that 5% of core funding (which equates to £55,045 in 2017/18).
 - Distribution Centre: Target of 6 months of overheads (£260,238 based on 2017/18 figures).

Designated Funds

A target of £200,000 for urgent computer developments which cannot be funded through normal revenue funding. This may include emergency or long-term projects on new systems. The fund was not used in 2017/18.

Main sponsors

We are extremely grateful to the Welsh Government for funding a large proportion of the Books Council's funding; without this support, it would not be possible for the Council to carry out its work.

Investments policy

In accordance with the Constitution, the charity trustees have the power to invest when they believe that investment is appropriate. The assets of the charity are available and sufficient to meet the visible future requirements.

Volunteers

The charity is very grateful for the contribution of volunteers who work free of charge on the various panels and projects of the Books Council. We cannot give a financial value to all this work; therefore, it is not included in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Related party transactions

The staff and trustees declare any interests annually and as they arise. There are no associated party transactions during the year ending 31 March 2018 by the trustees or any other member of the Management Team.

Risk Management

The Council has considered and assessed every risk that could affect the charity. This risk assessment process encompasses not only the financial situation but also strategic and circumstantial considerations. The Council confirms that systems have been established to mitigate all such risks identified as part of this process.

Going Concern Assumption

The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Books Council has sufficient resources to continue to act as a going concern. For that reason, it continues to prepare a Financial Statement based on being a living business.

STATEMENT OF THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES:

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities (SORP);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

The Trustees are responsible for keeping suitable accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a. Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Cyngor Llyfrau Cymru meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

b. Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is calculated based on purchase value. Commercial value is based on the objective of selling less that the estimated cost of disposal.

c. Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

Cyngor Llyfrau Cymru has a deficit balance on the Balance Sheet of £318,105 (2017: £842,146). This is as a result of the introduction of the liability associated with the Defined Benefit Pension. The Pension Deficit is a long-term liability and the charity is able to meet all its current liabilities. The short-term liability of the pension deficit is recognised by the trustees and they are able to meet these obligations. The trustees are of the view that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

d. Pension Costs

Cyngor Llyfrau Cymru operates a defined benefit pension within the Dyfed Pension Fund. With the adoption of FRS 102 in April 2014, this liability is shown in full on the Balance Sheet. The adjustments to the financial statement following this adjustment are shown in note 18, with the full pension liability shown in note 21.

e. Investments

Investments are stated at market value.

f. Fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

• Computers and other equipment – over 5 years

Freehold land and buildings are not depreciated as the residual value is higher than the value in the Balance Sheet.

g. Grants payable

Grants payable are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities when a constructive obligation exists notwithstanding that they may be paid in the future accounting periods.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (CONTINUED)

h. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies apply to categories of income:

- Grants: where related to performance and specific deliverables these are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance. Where income is received in advance of its recognition it is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income being received the income is accrued. Capital grants are accounted for as income as soon as they are receivable.
- Trading Income: income raised through the operation of the Distribution Centre under the charity's management is taken into account at the time a contractual obligation exists.
- Legacies: entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received. No value is included where the legacy is subject to a life interest held by another party.

i. Tax

The Charity is exempt from the need to pay corporation tax due to its charitable status.
